News from the National AAFP

After six Board meetings and the first seven months of my three year tenure, I am proud to bring you this message: the AAFP does a phenomenal amount for our members. It helps us work for our patients both directly and indirectly. The AAFP promotes our specialty to the public, and to decision makers.

The AAFP and the three other primary care organizations have composed joint principles for the Patient-Centered Medical Home, primary care education in medical schools for every student, and design of Accountable Care Organizations built upon a strong primary care base.

The AAFP continues to push for programs to get more students into Family Medicine, recognizing the immense value Family Physicians bring to health care systems and patients.

Our organization provides us a multitude of initiatives and programs. A visit to our Website, www.aafp.org reveals a wide expanse of services for our members:

- State and federal legislative advocacy, including a concerted effort to increase payment for primary care, and fixing the flawed Sustainable Growth Rate formula;
- Practice survival and enhancement, including advocacy for fair payment from private payers, information technology adoption and reasonable meaningful use requirements, development of an interoperable and secure Clinical Data Repository, TransforMED to develop medical homes for members;
- Dedicated efforts to find responsible grants (245 grants, totaling \$6.4M in the last calendar year) and other outside sources of non-dues revenue;
- The AAFP Foundation, now in its 53rd year, supporting AAFP's ALSO course, Physicians with Heart, the Children's Project, Chapter grants (Fam Med Philanthropic Consortium), Tar Wars, Americans in Motion (our obesity action program), Family Medicine research, student externships in FM, and the History of Family Medicine Center.
- CME, including the American Family Physician and Family Practice Management publications, the Annual Scientific Assembly, the National Conference of FM Residents and Students, topic-focused courses throughout the country, the new Life Long Learning Platform, practice improvement + CME = the AAFP METRIC program, and CME accreditation (one of the only three accreditors);
- Public health initiatives, evidence-based clinical practice guidelines, immunization policy development (with ACIP and CDC), AAFP National Research Network, Annals of Family Medicine, efforts to recruit and retain members, new AAFP Connection online community, ALF/NCSC to develop new leaders, chapter resources and strengthening, the annual Congress of Delegates, 8 websites (including www.AAFP.org, www.FamilyDoctor.org for patients, www.CenterforHealthIT.org, www.RobertGrahamCenter.org, www.FMIGnet.org, and www.TarWars.org), Facebook and Twitter content, professional journalism (AAFP News Now), proactive outreach public relations campaigns to members and the public, as well as leader messages to outside groups and decision makers;
- Representation in the AMA and WONCA (the world association of Family Doctors).

To help us move further along our path to excellence, the AAFP



is completing work with an expert contractor on organization-wide re-design. The goals are to improve member benefit, organizational structure, communication, and use of information technology. We will continue to be the bold champions for our specialty and our patients that we have become!

As the US Congress debates various aspects of the health reform law, the AAFP is prepared to defend the many programs and policies that will help our patients and Family Medicine. The list is long but the focus is on key initiatives that benefit our members, including physician workforce, access to Family Physicians, and fair payment for primary care.

I'll admit that I was very nervous after the Emeritus Committee had been created. Would anyone be interested? Within days, Marv contacted Sara. Immediately upon relocating to Santa Fe, David volunteered. I know there are many more of us out there. Tar Wars NM – Reaching New Heights in 2011!

Teaching students about the harms of commercial tobacco, while also educating about the traditional/ceremonial uses of tobacco...this gives you a sense of what Tar Wars NM is all about. Tar Wars is AAFP's program for 5th grade students to prevent smoking, and this year has been one of great growth here in NM. Under the leadership of two 4th year UNM medical students, Jessica Bryant and Mateo Alaniz (both headed into family medicine residencies) and pre-med student Andrew Goumas, the program reached close to 1,000 youth this school year. For their work, the three students have been nominated to receive one of Tar Wars national "Star Awards." Meanwhile, the prizes for the 5 winning posters from across the state include a trip to Washington D.C. for a chance to represent our

state, a chance to throw out the first pitch at an Isotopes game, and a trip to the NMAFP annual conference in Ruidoso.

The Native Health Initiative, a community-led partnership has coordinated the Tar Wars NM program over the past two years, inviting clinicians from around the state to get involved with this program, helping to get Tar Wars sessions into their local schools. 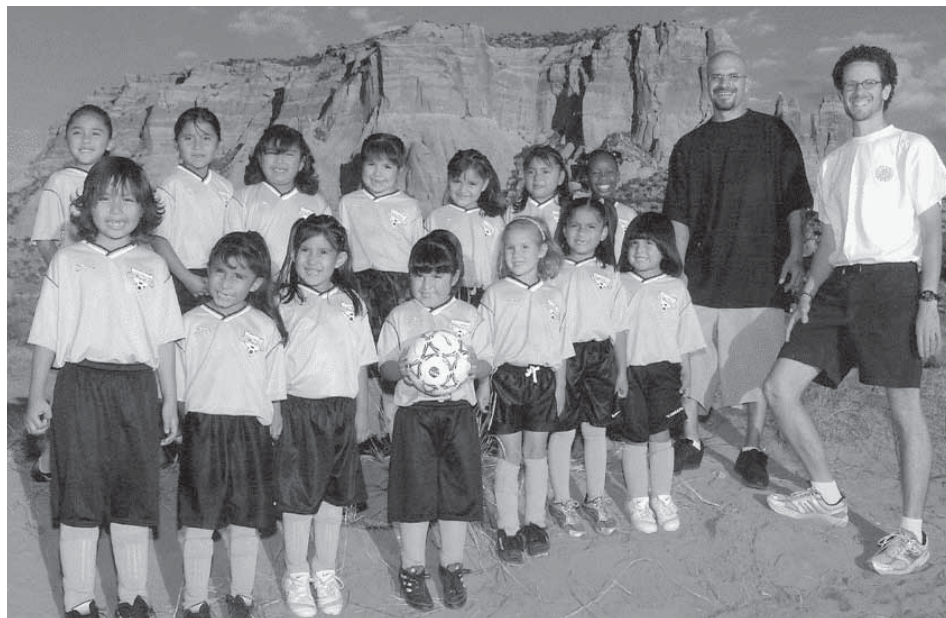
What Are You Doing This Summer?

Three years ago, when Dr. Tom Faber would ask this question of his pediatric patients on the Zuni Reservation, the answer was always the same: “nothing.” This lack of engaging summer activity for local youth led to the creation of the Zuni Youth Enrichment Project (ZYEP), a community-based 501(c) 3 organization dedicated to the health and wellness of Zuni youth.

Here on the Reservation, more than three quarters of Zuni adults are obese or overweight, and this contributes to a rate of type 2 diabetes that is among the highest in the world—more than 3 times the national average. More than half of Zuni kids are obese or overweight. As a recent family medicine graduate, I am excited to see such a great family medicine model in action and to have the opportunity to work with an organization that promotes health and works to reverse the trends of chronic disease at the community level.

In its first summer, ZYEP created a summer camp where 30 Zuni youth participated in daily physical activity, nutrition education, and cultural activities. This summer, ZYEP’s 3rd, 65 young campers (age 6-11) and 17 adolescent counselors will meet four hours per day throughout the summer to participate in physical activities including swimming, biking, hikes to sites of cultural significance to the Zuni people, archery, soccer and many more, teaching that regular physical activity is not only critical to good health, it is also a lot of fun! Nutritional activities include the planting, tending and harvesting of a traditional Zuni “waffle” garden and teaching campers to create their own health snacks. Cultural connection remains an important emphasis of the camp and activities like native dance, native oven building, Zuni pottery, visits to the local museum and more will help to strengthen the connections between this generation and the amazing cultural traditions of the Zuni people.



Though the sport is not well known on the Reservation, Zuni’s first soccer season was a great success!

It’s working! ZYEP believes that a strong evaluation phase is critical to program success. Camper evaluations have demonstrated statistically significant improvements in scores on a timed run and soda/Kool-Aid consumption. Additionally, strong trends were demonstrated toward improved strength, reduced body mass index, and greater fruit and vegetable consumption.

Keeping kids healthy over the summer, though, is just the beginning. ZYEP has recently been able to bring soccer to the Zuni pueblo. Though players had many challenges to deal with including a sport not well known on the Reservation, a long trip to play in the closest league (Gallup) about 45 minutes away, and prickly plants that made it hard to keep balls inflated, Zuni’s first soccer season was a great success. This spring we added a basketball league for kindergarten through second graders. Games were a blast and a true community event!

As you well know, wellness means more than physical health, and ZYEP works to build confidence and leadership among youth through the adolescent counselor program and a youth radio program “Teen Native Time”

where teens are able to speak with the community about the issues most important to them.

A core of family medicine is promoting the health of our communities and here in Zuni we are working to build a healthier community by engaging youth in positive and fun activities promoting cultural connection and healthy lifestyles. 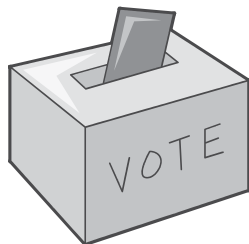

Members commented on the extra time that the Electronic Medical Record adds to their day.

Members have a problem with patients who are seen and billed under the state's SCI program then the state determines that they are not eligible and makes the practice refund the payment. Here is a quote by Randy Brown: "It seems to me that if the State qualifies the patient for coverage and the information they

gave was not accurate, the responsibility should stay with the state. As it is, the state found out a year after the fact then took the money back from our practice. If they could find out a year later, why didn't they do their job in the first place? And how can they possibly think that after they issued the card they can take back the payment for the care we provided? I can't believe we are the only practice that is taking this kind of hit. It is just more frustration".

We sent out requests for Doctor of the year and Vice President of the Chapter candidates.

We announced that the AAFP has joined the First Lady in support of the Let's Move!

Dan Derksen encouraged docs to contact their legislators in support of the Health Care Work Force Data Collection Act. This bill passed!

BOARD NOTES

April 16, 2011

■ **Winter Refresher Overview:** The 29th Annual NMAFP Winter Refresher had approximately 140 attendees. Final Evaluations gave the speakers and the overall conference high marks.

■ **Multi-State Forum:** Rick Madden, MD, Karen Phillips, MD and Sara Bittner attended. Drs. Madden & Phillips presented material on Legislative Affairs and Best Practices.

■ **July Ruidoso Conference:** Brochures have been mailed/online registration is running. Dr. Sally Bachofer indicated there would be a Leadership Opportunities in NMAFP and Beyond Luncheon on the first day. A blast email to the membership and article in the Summer Newsletter will help spread the word. A Job Forum will be held during the conference. Members can post listings of job opportunities in NM to be shared in particular with the graduating FM residents in attendance. Dr. Karen Vaillant will host a dinner at her house on Saturday evening, July 16th, for the residents, board members, faculty, and speakers. Dr. Jeff Cain, AAFP BOD, will also be invited.

■ **Residency Consortium Update:** Dr. James Wilterding indicated there was recent meeting of the Residency Consortium held in Santa Fe. This will cover the four current residencies as well as the two future residencies in NM. The Consortium is in the planning stage at this point but will definitely address issues that all residencies share in common. They are looking at other chapter residency consortiums to perhaps draw from their experience.

■ **Patient Appreciation Letter:** A letter of gratitude, from a patient of Dr. Roland Sanchez, was included in each packet. It was determined that a letter of congratulations be sent to Dr. Sanchez from the NMAFP Board.

■ **2012 State Conference Date:** Dr. Stephanie Benson, Scientific Program Chair for 2012, asked the Board to set a date for the Taos Conference. The Board decision was August 2-5, 2012. Dr. Benson suggested employing Pat Woodall, artist in Taos, to create a painting for the cover of the 2012 brochure. The painting would be of the Welcome Reception held on the Sagebrush Patio. Prints would be sold at the conference, and there would be a silent auction for the painting.

■ **Nominations for Vice President:** Dr. Pacheco asked the Board to visit with their peers to see if anyone is interested in running for Vice President. A blast email will be sent out to the membership.

■ **Med Student Reception, 09-23-11:** Dr. Dion Gallant came up with this idea during his year as President of NMAFP, and it has grown in popularity and size over the last five years, making a new venue mandatory. An ad hoc committee will communicate by email as to how the reception will be organized, and a report will be given to the Board in July. Dr. Wilterding will chair, and Drs. Gallant, Benson, Lanier, and Vaillant and Jesus Tafoya will be on the committee. The 6th Annual Med Student Reception will be held at the Embassy Suites Hotel.

■ **Need for Board Members to Solicit Support from their Institutions:** Dr. Dion Gallant shared information with the board regarding past and, hopefully, future support for our upcoming conferences. Dr. Gallant will research the possibility of a Presbyterian Foundation Grant in support of our summer conference and challenged the other Board Members to do the same. Dr. Gallant shared a document with the Board showing that NMAFP supports the med school and the residencies in the amount of approximately \$26,500 annually.

■ **Budget Meeting:** The 2011-2012 Budget Meeting will be held on Saturday, September 24, 2011, 9:00 am, NMAFP Office, Albuquerque.

■ **Physician of the Year Nominations Update:** Dr. Pacheco shared the names of four individuals that have been nominated for this award. Deadline for nominations is May 1. All nominations will be sent to Board Members on May 2, and the winner will be announced at the Awards Dinner/ Dance, July 15th, in Ruidoso. The POY will receive a Nambe plaque and NMAFP will pay his/her 2012 AAFP/NMAFP dues.

■ **AAFP Update:** Dr. Rick Madden, MD, AAFP BOD, gave a brief overview of the current activities of AAFP. Having Dr. Madden on the AAFP BOD provides an excellent opportunity for Board Members to hear first-hand what is happening at the national level.

■ **Student Report:** Jesus Tafoya, President, gave a report to the Board about the FMIG. Two lunch lectures have been organized primarily for the first- and second-year students. Dr. Wilterding and Dr. North will present to the med students, and NMAFP will pay for the lunches. A suturing workshop and an IV workshop are in the planning stages.

■ **CME Committee Re-Resurrection:** A discussion ensued as to how the CME Committee can give support to the current Scientific Program Chair. The past three or four Scientific Program Chairs should make up this committee. It would be a rolling committee, and a speaker bank should be set up. Dr. Melissa Martinez suggested using Google Docs for a speaker bank. The current CME Committee will be made up of Drs. Pacheco, Bachofer, Benson and Gomez.

■ Committee Reports:

Legislative Affairs: Drs. Dan Derksen & Rick Madden gave a wrap up of the 2011 60-day Legislative Session that ended in mid-March. Senate Bill 14, Healthcare Workforce Data Collections Act, that NMAFP was passionate about, was signed into law at the last minute on April 8th.

Emeritus Committee: Dr. David Lanier asked the Board what the particular focus should be for the Committee and how active would the Board like the Emeritus Committee to be. The Board definitely would like the Committee to focus on their particular passions in FM and to be assertive in their initiatives.

■ **Invitation to Pre-Med Students:** Dr. Lourdes Vizcarra suggested that the Pre-Med Students should be invited to attend all FM Conferences, at no cost, as are the Med Students and FM Residents. The Board liked the idea, and Dr. Vizcarra will make contact and share the Ruidoso Brochure with the group.

■ **Chapter History Booklet Update:** Dr. Dan Derksen addressed the Board about updating the Chapter History Booklet periodically. It would be an ongoing process, and NMAFP would need to contract Michael Dupont for this project. Dr. Derksen will look into the cost and will report to the Board in July.
